**Executive Summary:**

AFC Fylde have currently secured funding for two schemes – Writing Wrongs and Positive Pathways

Under POCA AFC Fylde applied for two sets of funding – one has been redirected under other routes and this one is being considered for extra funding in view of its similarities to the scheme already funding and is seen more of a 'bolt on' to the above schemes

The amount requested is £10,000 and was felt worthy of consideration by those shortlisting the POCA forms

## 'Appendix B

AFC Fylde have submitted a request for funding to support an initiative targeted at the Fylde Coasts more vulnerable people.

The target audience is for age groups 12 – 18 year olds and feels that success has been positively felt for over 1200 young people by active engagement who have taken part in multi sports, diversionary outreach projects based in high risk areas.

The programme works with referrals from the Constabulary's Early Action teams, Community Safety Partnerships and LCC Youth Offending teams.

The activities have been based at:

Kirkham Memorial Park, Ashton Garden St Anne's and Freckleton Memorial Park. In measuring the success of these initiative an evaluation has taken place with the following results.

In recognising the vulnerability of themselves being intimidated in open spaces and that many programmes to be actively engaged in did not include themselves 89% stated that they would welcome the opportunity to take part in free sports activities and accredited leadership schemes.

In demonstrating the need for the scheme 90% of residents stated that they had been victims of anti social behaviour or had witnessed it. 94% of residents indicated that the parks weren't safe places to be in the evening.

The scheme itself is match funded from the Big Lottery fund and Fylde Community Safety partnership. And wishes to use the funding to good effect in changing people's lives with the following programme to stimulate activity in a positive way.

Taking place on Monday – Thursday both Lower Lane Estate and Hove Road Park will, in the early evenings run sessions by a level two national governing body multi sports coach together with a youth worker.

Those taking part in the 20 week course will receive a national accreditation in sports coaching and will learn and develop the following schemes: Leadership, Conflict management and behavioural control, risk assessments, first aid and H & S.

In addition those on the scheme at risk of offending will learn the positive outlets of how to engage in the community, develop as positive citizens and community peer mentors.

In submitted the application AFC Fylde feel this project actively supports three of the four Police and Crime objectives particularly in respect of tackling crime and re offending, protecting vulnerable people and defend the frontline.

The scheme intends to engage with 22 individuals at each session totalling 88 people.

AFC Fylde are very proactive in the submission of evaluation data and it is hoped that this grant would provide the opportunity to assess whether this is something that we would look to commission in the future through an appropriate tendering process.
