TACKLING CRIME AND RE-OFFENDING PORFOLIO – SPENDING 2016 – 17

Training Initiative – Elected Members linked to Taxi Drivers

Following a recent meeting with Jane Booth – Chair of Childrens Safeguarding Board and now Chair of Adult Safeguarding Board - proposal to support a joint initiative for training to elected members of all councils as a result of the recent issues with South Ribble a safeguarding approach to protect elected members when presiding over hearings.

Consideration for the training to be on the current BCU footprint but now consider six training sessions. Retired Detective Inspector Tony Baxter is already doing some work in this area with the taxi drivers themselves and has agreed to do the training commencing in September.

Anticipated costs are £150 per session together with some preparation time, vat and expenses.

Total approximate cost £1000 - £1500

Red Rose Recovery – Recovery Infrastructure Organisation (RIO)

The Commissioner funds substance misuse services across LCC together with Blackburn with Darwen and Blackpool. The funding for LCC is awarded to Red Rose Recovery – part of this group is the RIO and is supported by NHS, Mental Health, Phoenix Group, The Well and other recovery support groups. The aim of the group is a shared vision for consistency and support for substance misuse schemes.

Recent meeting – discussed the supporting of a page in a calendar for sale cost £100 per page – lots of support and commitment from other members of the group

Angela - just to give you an update following our meeting with Jane Booth and Victoria Gibson

Victoria and I have today met with Tony Baxter and agreed the following actions in respect of the three training sessions to elected members following the South Ribble taxi issue

- Rather than three sessions based on a BCU footprint six seems more viable particularly in respect of the geographics around Lancaster/Morecambe and there connection to Blackpool
- Jane Booth/ Victoria will contact the Chief Execs and look for SPOCs in the councils together with dates of elected members meetings
- Training will last 1 hour and be tagged on to a meeting
- Likely to start September – Tony Baxter is away July/August – and so perhaps will many of the members
- Letter to member to indicate the 6 dates across the county and allow to choose but link to event brite will record take up of attendance and accountability
- Victoria to provide case studies/lessons learned
- Tony has recently been providing training to taxi drivers at Blackpool and Fylde and will inform elected members of what the drivers receive in terms of training and look at the implications for themselves when they attend hearings and potentially don't revoke licences/

Rough costs (which we agreed to fund at our meeting) = £150 + vat and expenses x 6 sessions and perhaps a bit of prep for the session. –
